# Foreign stars facing English crackdown

FAUSTINO ASPRILLA, Juninho, Branco, Tomas Brolin and Tony Yeboah could find themselves caught up in a new crackdown on foreign players

England are among many countries who plan to counteract the continental floodgates pened by the Bosman case by utting up the barriers to restr the number of non-European Union players a club can have.

Leeds with their three
Africans, and the north east's Atricans, and the north east's South American stars could find themselves squeezed, along with clubs like West Ham who have signed a whole legion of foreigners from all round the world.

Premier League chief executive Rick Parry emerged from a Eurosummit in Windsor yesterday to confirm the widespread move, although it was opposed by Scotland and

they intend to do about non-EU players, but most of us intend to introduce restrictions for next season," said Parry.

"It is important for UEFA to make clear what they intend to do in terms of their own competitions, because it is UEFA's rules which have been

more harmful to English clubs in the past than our own restrictions.

"As a Premier League we have yet to debate what we should put in place. At the moment we have a restriction to three players — but that is simply because when we rewrote the rule book at Christmas we replaced 'non-UK' with 'non-EU'." "As a Premier League we

With the players' ur with the players' union deeply concerned at the tidal wave of outsiders into the domestic game following the European Court decision while ruled the 'three-plus-two' rule illegal, there will be pressure put up whatever new barriers possible.

The nine national associations who met yesterday, headlined by Franz Beckenbauer and Germany, are urging Sunday's general UEFA assembly in London to press for Brussels to grant football a transition period to comply with the Bosman judgement. the Bosman judgement.

National governments are to be urged to back moves to make sport a special case under future treaties; a working party with representatives from pr leagues and clubs may be formed; and a study of all transfer systems, with a view to harmonisation, should be undertaken.

But Parry believes all attempts to resist the implications of the European Court judgement are pointless

"The time has gone when people can believe it is going to go away. The clock is ticking; go away. The crock is treking; players are ready, agents are ready and if we are not careful the only people who won't be ready are the people who run the game," he said.

"The Bosman judgement was absolutely clear and its effect was immediate. Like a lot of people, I feel it is now inevitable and we should be looking forward.

"Others feel they need a little time to take on board the knock-on effects, and everyone supports the principle of solidarity — no-one wants to see the smaller countries suffering.

"And constructive dialogue makes sense to prevent decisions in other areas which could be even more calamitous than

"But the notion of a blanket exemption for sport is absurd. I have never felt that we were beyond the law.

The Bosman case also ruled significant areas of the transfer system illegal, particularly involving out-of-contract players, and has prompted radical rethinks with the Dutch planning to abandon their set-up.

Both Parry and FA chief executive Graham Kelly believe the English system will survive, though in a different form.

"We are very proud of our domestic system in England and we shall maintain it for as long as we possibly can," said Kelly.

"It is a fair system which operates by and large in the interests of the whole game, in the interests of the smaller clubs as well as the bigger clubs and for the lesser
