Injured biker dies in hospital

ONE of the three men injured in yesterday's horror crash in Dublin city centre has died. He was the 300th person to die on our roads so far this year.

The latest victim named as Neil Brett (22), originally from Avenue Road, in Dundalk but was residing at the Old Distillery, Beresford Street, Dublin. He was one of two motor cyclists struck by a van at the Butt Bridge/Customs House quay junction just before 8.00am yesterday.

The driver of the van has been discharged from hospital while the other biker is in a stable condition in the Mater hospital.

Dart commuters crossing the bridge watched in horror as the van collided with both bikes, somersaulted in the air and hit an ESB pole.

Sex queen facing loss of millions

A DUBLIN woman who made millions from controlling prostitution was today expected to be stripped of her fortune.

Josie Daly's business made £7.5m in two years.

She lived in a £700,000 villa named after her dead dog Bunty, who was buried in the back garden.

Daly (64), of Hornsey, north London, has admitted charges of controlling prostitution for gain.

She was today due for sentencing and has been told she faces a substantial financial penalty, as well as confiscation orders on her assets.

However she will not be sent to jail.

Daly, who attended the court on the last occasion in a wheelchair, controlled dozens of prostitutes working from three brothels.

Police claim she recruited girls from the West Midlands and let them stay in a hostel she owned in London.

Daly's empire collapsed after her brothels were raided by undercover police. She was arrested in 1998.

Up to 1,500 punters a week visited her parlours in Holloway, Hoxsey, Crouch End and Wood Green. She

took in up to £1m each year from the £10 entrance fee charges to punters.

The prostitutes were allowed to keep whatever fees they earned after that.

Daly advertised her services in police publications and a magazine for firemen.

She had licences from local authorities to run her premises as saunas. She also ran an aromatherapy centre with

properly qualified masseurs to maintain her eligibility for a licence.

Customers to the premises were met by a receptionist and handed a menu with sauna and massage services.

On payment of £10 or £15, they would then be asked to choose a girl from the reception area.

The hearing was told that Daly, who now has heart

trouble, controlled dozens of prostitutes but never received earnings made by the girls.

She declared an annual turnover of £250,000 to the Inland Revenue and since her arrest also declared a further £350,000.

The court heard that more than £104,000 in cash was discovered in Daly's bedroom during a police raid.
