PLANS for the refurbishment of County Hall have been given the nod by county councillors, despite an 11th hour appeal for them again to consider a greenfield site for a new £25 million

building complex.

The overall cost of the

include a new building at the site of Dr. Furlong's, moving the IT department there from county hall, an enlarged and modernised cham ber and extensive inter nal remodelling of the old jail, has been put in lion to £16 million.

During a progress briefing by Alastair Coey architects and Hall Black Douglas, councillors were told it could be 18 months to two years before the move to Dr. Furlong's would be possible. Fol-lowing opposition from local people, the issue has gone to appeal at An Bord Pleanala.


Deputy Brendan Howl-in said there didn't seem to have been much progress, but the con-sultants said things were proceeding as fast as could be expected.

And aspects of the refurbishment of the chamber may not need planning permission because of the extensive work already carried

Appealing for consideration to be given to a greenfield site, Senator Jim Walsh and several other members, said the lack of adequate park-ing was a serious issue.

'It seems to be a waste of taxpayer's money to go down the route that we're going down in relation to this one,' said Deputy John

'There are no car park-ing facilities here. If Dr. Furlong's is going to be developed, it's going to be mayhem,' said the

Architect Stephen Douglas said the Dr. Furlong's development included proper traffic

management.
'What's the position with regard to car parking? That's the biggest issue we have. I came here a moment ago and it was impossible to et anywhere to park,' said Cllr. Leo Carthy. Cllr. Anna Fenlon, who is partially disabled, said cars were parked across the disabled spaces as well.

'Am I going to be reduced to someone giving me a piggy back up here?' she asked.

'It makes no sense to try to continue to develop here. Don't com-pound the error that we

made previously, said Senator Walsh. 'Car parking is a very live issue,' said Mr. Dou-glas, 'disabled parking spaces should be proper-ly monitored and main-tained.'
