Water turns brown in Enniscorthy

TAPS IN Enniscorthy ran brown for several hours at the weekend as the town's treatment as the town's treatment plant struggled to cope with an extra load of mud in the River Slaney on Saturday. However, council engi-neer John Lambe has assured householders that the murky mains supply was perfectly fit to drink. Water being drawn

from the river at Clon-haston is routinely test-ed for 'colour' and the equipment showed a record high reading of 450 at one stage during the weekend. The treatment plant at Vinegar Hill is capable of pro-ducing a clear supply with a reading of anything up to 400 but the extra burden of silt

'We have never had it as bad,' commented engineer Lambe. 'Usually we have very good water in this town.' He blamed recent heavy rains for the problem and suggested that runoff from recently ploughed land may have contributed to the very brown colour of very brown colour of the Slaney.
